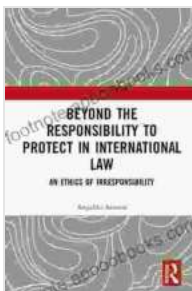


An Ethics of Irresponsibility: Rethinking Responsibility Amidst Climate Catastrophe

In the face of climate catastrophe, the concept of responsibility has become increasingly complex and contested. Instead of focusing on individual responsibility, Magnúsdóttir argues that we need to develop a new ethics of irresponsibility. This ethics, she says, would reject the idea that individuals are solely responsible for their actions and instead recognize the ways in which our actions are shaped by the systems in which we live. It would also emphasize the importance of collective action and systemic change, and would recognize the need for a just and equitable transition to a sustainable future.

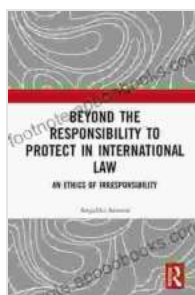

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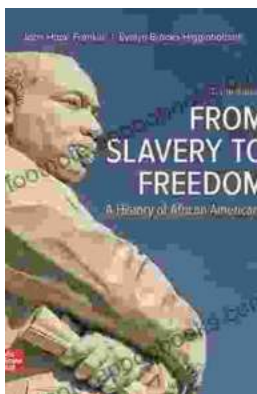
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
